## KITCHEN FIRES

# HELP US AVOID THESE TYPES OF FIRES!



#### **Kitchen fires**

Never try to move a flaming pot or pan. Never throw water on a grease fire.

## In case of a kitchen fire

## you should

- use oven mittens to avoid being burned and if possible, place a lid on the pot or pan to put out the fire and then carefully move it to the centre of the stove;
- turn off all stove elements and the range hood;
- call **911** even if the fire seems to be out.

### If you cannot get the fire under control

- quickly leave the premises using the nearest safe exit;
- activate the manual fire alarm if you live in a building equipped with a fire alarm system;
- go to the outdoor gathering area;
- call **911**.

## Useful tips for preventing <u>fires</u>

- Do not leave your stove unattended when cooking.
- Avoid using a pot or pan to fry food. It is strongly recommended that you use an approved deep fryer with an adjustable temperature control.
- Acquire a portable fire extinguisher (ABC 5 lb) and familiarize yourself with its use before having to use it.
- Use a pot or pan with a diameter equal or larger than the stove element.
- Always keep the pot or pan's lid nearby and use a timer.
- Regularly clean cooking surfaces and the range hood.
- Keep flammable objects like oven gloves or plastic pots far from the stove.

## Useful tips for preventing burns

- Never let children near cooking appliances.
- Avoid wearing clothing with loose sleeves when cooking.
- Turn pot and pan handles away from the edges of the stove.
- Avoid rugs that do not stick to the floor so that you don't trip while carrying hot plates.

#### **Prevention begins at home**

Always pay attention and never leave the kitchen when you are cooking. Oil is a combustible liquid. It ignites easily when reaching around 300 degrees Celsius. After a kitchen fire, it is important to have the stove and range hood inspected by a professional before using them again.
